ID BADGE POLICY





COMMUNITY UPDATES FROM THE CROA BOARD







Whether you're enjoying the weather, getting out and walking or bicycling throughout town before the summer's heat, preparing for the end of the school year, thinking about summer travel, or other festivities, May is a marvelous time of year in Gelebration.

As you will find in this edition of the Celebration News, many activities and resources exist for families and individuals of all ages. This article from the Board of Directors of the Celebration Residential Owners Association (CROA) provides helpful information and updates for our residents and guests.

First, Celebration is preparing to unveil the new athletic and recreation facility. Just approved by CROA's Board of Directors 15 months ago, the quality and pace of construction is going well. With three athletic fields (one with synthetic turf and two with grass), a concession building with restrooms, parking, and lighting, this spectacular resource is just about ready to open. The Recreation Committee is working hard with finalizing policies and procedures, including priorities, costs, hours and logistics. The CROA Board has approved additional resources for this facility, including some benches, tables, and a lightning prediction system. Watch for details regarding the grand opening of this facility on our website and Friday Flash.


Second, the current parks and facilities master plan process moved forward during April. The on-line survey has two audiences: a randomly selected group of homeowners, and all homeowners (these two data points help with understanding the results). The consultant hired for this process is currently analyzing the data. The CROA Board is looking forward to receiving their report and will be actively conducting discussions about capital improvements initiatives, both large and small. The longawaited athletic and recreation facility for our community, noted above, cost approximately \$4.5 million; while CROA's current and future funding is strong, this investment essentially drained the capital reserves that had been saved over many years.

Third, the CROA Board for 2019-2020 began its service with multiple workshops and discussions in March and April; the monthly Board meeting and various workshops are open to all residents and are available via live streaming. In addition, the CROA Board is active with multiple other initiatives, including a new Technology Committee, a newly formed Condo Council, and continued opportunities for participation in our other five standing committees. The Board is discussing expansion of the recently relocated, and highly successful, Farmers Market; also scheduled is an external review by a UCF team regarding efficiencies and sustainability with management tools and procedures. The CROA Board continues to identify ways of improving the experiences and overall quality of life in Celebration. So please attend or review meetings online, share your ideas, and engage staff and Board members in this process.

Fourth, you may be interested in knowing about an initiative on the horizon this year. As you may know much of Celebration's policies and procedures are governed by our Charter, established with the founding of Celebration 25 years ago. Periodically, changes are proposed to keep the Charter current and appropriate for changing needs. Homeowners through voting must approve any changes. The CROA Board is now starting the process for this review, the most recent of which occurred in 2014. More details about opportunities for participation and input will be forthcoming, with notices in the Celebration News, website and Friday Flash.

Finally, special events and activities for the near future include the Summer Breakout, Community Chorus Concert, the Memorial Day Flag Ceremony, and a special welcome to our next season (Aloha to Summer!!). In addition, July 4 calls for some fun and patriotic events in town. You can read more about each of these – and more – in this edition of the Celebration News, as well as in the Friday Flash and on our website.

As always, there is a lot going on. Enjoy the merry month of May in Celebration!

Alley Protocol & SAFETY

The District owns and maintains all alleys in the community, which are designated for local traffic getting to and from their garages. The District also maintains alley lighting and helps increase the level of security in the alleys.

GUIDELINES:


- Alleys may not be blocked at any time, which includes staging
 materials, parking by residents, and parking by construction or
 maintenance contractors. All vehicles must be legally parked on the
 roadways, on your private driveway, or elsewhere but never in the
 alleys.
- While they are public access thoroughfares, they should not be used to bypass stop signs or slower traffic since the speed limit is lower and alleys are generally narrower than the main roadways.
- Obey one-way alley signage, both for your safety and that of your neighbors.
- Speeding and going the wrong way in the alleys are ticketable offenses, and alleys may be patrolled for these violators.
- If you notice contractors or residents not complying with these guidelines, contact the sheriff's non-emergency number, 407-348-2222, while the offense is occurring.

SAFETY TIPS:

- Pedestrians always have the right-ofway.
- Children often play in or near the alley areas, so be careful when driving in the alleys.
- Keep your back gate, back door, and garage doors locked to prevent theft.
- Report any alley lighting outages to the District office for prompt repair.
- Enhance alley lighting with your own porch light or landscape light to reduce places where someone can hide.
- Include your address on the rear of your house to assist emergency vehicles and law enforcement in finding the right location in cases of emergency.

Responsiblities in Celebration

For Owners | Residents | Renters Of Single Family Homes

Within the community of Celebration, homeowners and residents (occupants of residential properties) have a commitment to maintain their property in a neat, attractive, and well-landscaped condition to enhance the overall beauty and aesthetic appeal of the community (Charter 6). These efforts help to maintain the property values of all our homes, making Celebration a desirable place to live. The Celebration Charter refers to residential properties as "Units" which includes the land as well as any structure or other improvements on the Unit (Charter, Chapter 3.1).

PART TIME RESIDENTS

Whether you reside here full time or only live in Celebration part time, community standards apply to your Celebration residence all the time. Communitywide inspections are conducted throughout the year and you may receive an emailed notice for a violation(s) or mailed notice to your "away" home. Owners/residents living outside of Celebration have a responsibility to comply with the governing documents and uphold the community standards described in the Celebration Charter and Design Guidelines. Please ensure your property is taken care of during your absence. Should you receive a notice of violation, make arrangements to correct the issues before your return to Celebration if your return is beyond the correction timeline described in the notice. Your neighbors will appreciate your attention in these matters.

RENTERS

If you are a renter in a Celebration single family home, you probably worked out an agreement with your landlord regarding routine home maintenance, general upkeep, cleaning, landscaping, and repairs. All single family homes are inspected on a routine schedule. Community standards violations, when noted, are emailed or mailed to the owner who then contacts the renter. As a renter, you should discuss with the homeowner regarding which of you will take care of the noted violation(s) and agree on a plan of action to correct the issues within the timeline described in the notice. The community of Celebration benefits from the cooperation of all renters and owners in upholding landscaping, cleaning, repair, and aesthetic standards.

Homeowners who live in Celebration full time already know the value of upholding community standards. It is one of the reasons you moved into Celebration. As per the Celebration Charter, each owner shall maintain his or her Unit, including all structures, parking areas, landscaping, and other improvements (including, but not limited to fences, mail boxes, play equipment, yard art, and exterior equipment) comprising the Unit, in a manner consistent with the governing documents and the Community-Wide Standard, unless such maintenance responsibility is otherwise assumed by or assigned to the Celebration Residential Owners Association (CROA) as part of a Service Area (Charter 6.1).

Each owner shall also be responsible for maintaining, mowing, replacing sod, pruning, and irrigating the landscaping within that portion of any adjacent common area or public right-of-way, street, or alley lying between the Unit boundary and any wall, fence, or curb located on the common area or public right-of-way, street, or alley in a manner consistent with the governing documents and Community-Wide Standard, unless responsibility for maintaining such landscaped areas has been assigned to or assumed by CROA (Charter 6.1).

UNITS WITHIN SERVICE AREAS

In certain specific cases, Units may be assigned to Service Areas where CROA to provides maintenance to the townhome, duplex, triplex or single family unit as specified in the Supplemental Declaration of the Service Area. (Charter 3). As applicable, costs associated with maintenance, repair, replacement, and/or landscaping are assessed as a Service Area assessment against the owners of the Units in a Service Area (Charter 3.1).

CONDOMINIUM ASSOCIATIONS

Condominium associations maintain common property and any other property for which the condominium association has maintenance responsibility in a manner consistent with the governing documents, the Community-Wide Standard, and all applicable covenants (Charter, Chapter 6.2).

CATEGORIES FOR COMMUNITY STANDARDS

Community standards apply to all site work, painting, landscaping, structures, improvements, and other items placed on a Unit in a manner or location visible from outside of any existing structures on the Unit, as well as modifications to the interior of screened porches, patios, and any other portions of a structure visible from outside of the structure (Charter, Chapter 5.1).

Community standards are defined in the Celebration Charter within Chapter 5 (Architecture, Landscaping, & Aesthetic), Chapter 6 (Maintenance, Repair, & Replacement), and Exhibit "C" Rules, as well as various CROA Board-approved Design Guidelines. For inspection purposes, community standards were defined in six categories with examples as follows: (examples are not all inclusive)

- LANDSCAPE: lawn, plants, mulch, lawn art, landscape screening, pavers, trellis, potted plants, hose storage.
- CLEANING: house exterior, roof, sidewalk, driveway, porch, steps, fence.
- PAINTING: house, garage, trim, porch, steps, chimney, exterior lights, doors, garage doors, mailbox and post, foundation and stem walls.
- REPAIR: stucco / siding damage, wood deterioration, fences, screens, railings, columns, garage doors, shutters, mailbox and post.
- ARCHITECTURAL: shutters, awnings, fans, door hardware, flags, fountains, mailbox and post, dormer windows, gutters & gutter extensions, address number on house and mailbox, light fixtures.
- MISCELLANEOUS: signs, debris pick-up, garbage and recycle bin storage, unapproved changes, holiday lights and decorations, cameras, satellite stands, cables, storage of items, vehicles, leases, home businesses, and items not categorized into above groups.

Celebration homeowners and residents are thankfully responsive to Community Standards' emails and notices, there is always room for improvement. Articles regarding community standards are published in Celebration News to help homeowners and residents become familiar with specifics and serve as a reminder when we undertake home maintenance and improvement projects. THE HOMEOWNERS' role in crime prevention

Would you go to the bank, take out wads of cash, and then leave the money on a seat in the movie theater? Would you go to Best Buy and purchase a computer then purposely leave it on the roof of your car as you drive away? How about purchasing a Rolex watch and leave it on the counter of the Denny's bathroom and walk out? Fortunately, these exact situations haven't occurred in Celebration, but similarly some make it just as easy for "criminal opportunists" to take your stuff, by leaving doors unlocked or expensive items lying about. Just the other day a resident called in a suspicious vehicle in front of their home with the engine running. I found the doors unlocked and the keys in the ignition. Besides being illegal, when I found the owner and explained the easy theft opportunity, they stated "Oh not in Celebration."



In a perfect world, or many decades ago, you could actually leave things unlocked. It's a sad reality, but in 2019 and in an area with a high transient (not homeless or needy) population, things cannot be left unlocked or unattended. Yes, even in Celebration! The cops can't be everywhere, all the time. This is where you come in. Homeowners and citizens are really the first line of defense in crime prevention. Here are some easy tips and ideas to consider and implement.

TIP #1: LOCK YOUR DOORS.

It may seem obvious, but I've mentioned this many times before and we still see people leaving doors unlocked on homes and cars. Many burglaries don't have any forced entry, meaning people are leaving doors and windows unlocked. Make sure ALL doors and windows are closed and locked. Homes should have deadbolt locks on exterior doors, which extend at least one inch into the frame. Double cylinder locks, requiring a key on both sides of the door are not recommended because they can trap people inside in the event of a fire or other emergency. Door frames can be easily reinforced to help prevent or hamper kick-ins. Shut your garage door when leaving home or not in direct sight. Remember to lock the door leading from the garage to the house, even if the garage door is down.

TIP #2: KEEP VALUABLES OUT OF SIGHT.

Even with doors locked and windows shut, anything, which looks like a purse or computer bag, is likely a target for a broken window. In broad daylight the other day, at CVS right across the street, a workout bag left on the seat was taken from a vehicle after the window was broken out. Please keep all valuables, or anything looking valuable, out of sight.

TIP #3: CASE THE JOINT.

Take a walk around your home and think like a burglar or thief. Look for ways that you could get into your home. All points of entry, including sliding glass doors, windows or any opening that could be broken or forced open should be your first check. Outside of your home, take note what pricey items are in view, tempting would-be burglars and thieves. This includes bikes left on the porch or any other valuables left outside. Also peek through your own windows to see what a criminal may see when looking inside further tempting them. Do this during the day and night, with your normal lights on. In most cases, items in your homes are much more visible when it is dark outside.

TIP #4: TRIM YOUR LANDSCAPE.

Check your yard and think like a bad guy. Look at your home from the street and around the yard during both day and nighttime hours. Can you clearly view the front door and all windows? Are the shrubs trimmed to below the window sill? Can they also see around your home? I know privacy is important, but if you or a neighbor can't see a door or window, it means a burglar also has a nice hiding spot to take their time getting inside. Trim bushes and trees to discourage burglars from using them as hiding places and keep shrubs in front of windows trimmed to below the window sill. Trees should be trimmed up to have at least a six foot clearance. Consider planting thorny shrubs for an added deterrent.

TIP #5: CHECK YOUR LIGHTING AND INSTALL CAMERAS.

Lighting is a great method to deter criminal activity. The use of proper lights and lighting techniques doesn't have to cost a lot of money. LED lights cost pennies a night to operate. Check the street and alley lights around your home. Report any outages or the need for tree trimming to the CCDD, proper authority or management company. Camera system prices have come down and provide clear footage.

TIP #6: KNOW YOUR NEIGHBORS.

Often, crimes, suspicious persons or activity is reported by your neighbors. If you know each other, and know which people or vehicles belong in the neighborhood, you are better able to report what doesn't look right. We still get calls about suspicious cars that end up belonging to your neighbors. Remember your neighbors are usually your best ally in protecting your home.

TIP #7: USE THE ALARM SYSTEM.

Most, if not all homes, in Celebration have an alarm or the ability to activate or install one. Alarm companies have systems for all price points. An effective alarm should include contacts at all entry points, motion sensors inside the house, and a loud outdoor siren that alerts the entire neighborhood when someone has unlawfully entered. There are options for pet sensors also. When investigating crimes, we find many alarms were not used or activated. A burglar most often won't stick around long if a siren is blaring alerting neighbors and/or the police. Also make sure your alarm company has the correct contact information to call you in the event of an emergency.

TIP #8: ENGRAVE IT, LOCK IT OR LOSE IT.

To help keep your belongings safe and secure, you should write down and photograph the make, model and serial numbers of your bikes and other valuables. We have been able to recover stolen items simply by having them entered in a database using their serial numbers or matching pictures of recovered items. Engrave other valuables by using your driver's license or identifying marks. Never use a social security number as an ID number. When parking your bike in public, lock it to a bike rack or other large object. Run the lock cable through the frame, not just a tire.

TIP #9: REGISTER YOUR CARS.

It is required by law to have the correct address on your vehicle registration and driver license. For those just moving to Celebration, you have only a short time to obtain a Florida registration or to update your address. While not required by law, it's also a good idea to register your car with Celebration Town Hall and obtain a Celebration sticker. By having the correct address on your registration and having a Celebration sticker, it helps us determine that your car belongs in town. Also remember if there is a natural disaster or other emergency, without a local address, you may not be allowed back in the area.

While there aren't any definitive answers to prevent all crimes from occurring, if you follow all these tips and others I've written about, you can certainly lessen your chances of being a victim.

Specially trained crime prevention deputies will come to your home and conduct a free security survey. They will offer you recommendations and suggestions how to better prepare and secure your house. LET YOUR VOICE BE HEARD

Hello fellow citizens, I wanted to emphasize the importance of using your voice to be heard by voting. On May 21, 2019, there will be a special election. The single-subject ballot will allow voters to decide whether or not to increase the local sales tax by 1% for the purpose of funding transportation projects.

Some questions I have received from citizens regarding this sales tax:

 Has the County Commission voted to increase ad valorem tax if this sales tax does not pass?

No, the Board of County Commissioners has not voted to increase the ad valorem tax. However, there has been a commissioner that brought up a discussion on the board has expressed the possibility of increasing property tax if this sales tax does not pass. As a solution to increase transportation revenue, I encourage citizens to reach out to their commissioner and voice your opinion and thoughts on potential increases of property tax. You can find the contact information for the commissioners at www.osceola.org. If this sales tax does not pass, I commit to you that I will be

voting NO on increasing property taxes. If brought forward as a vote to the board, instead I would insist that our board focus on re-evaluation of our current 1.2 billion budget in detail to find potential revenue.

Does this tax also cover Public Transportation?

Yes, Lynx and Sunrail would be allowable expenses under the proposed ballot language. In addition, road widening, improved intersections, sidewalks, bike paths, etc. The SunRail is scheduled for 2021, which means we take over costs at that time and we currently do not have funds set aside for this.

Can the Board guarantee that the funding will go 90% toward roads?

No, there is no guarantee on what percentage will be going towards only roads as this referendum is written. I have expressed concerns on this during our public meeting. You are welcome to watch the meeting of February 18 on **www.osceola.org**.

I do believe in the people's right to make this decision. Please know that I am hopeful that many citizens will come out and express their vote. You can vote early and by mail. 

MAY IS **NATIONAL WATER** SAFETY MONTH

May is National Water Safety month and with summer quickly approaching most of us will find ourselves enjoying some relaxation time by the pool or at the beach.

No matter your age, it is important to stay alert and be mindful if you are in or around water. Even though swimming is one of summer's most popular activities, it unfortunately increases the number of unintentional drownings or near-drowning accidents and injuries.

There are plenty of ways to be proactive and demonstrate water safety precautions in our own community. An emergency can happen at any time, so it is important to be able to recognize and respond to any emergency. Be vigilant and maintain constant supervision at all times, if you see something say something. Before visiting the pool with family and friends, discuss a safety plan in case of an emergency. In addition, many of us who live in Florida have pools right in our backyard. When not using your pool at home, make sure you have safety procedures set in place.

When visiting a community or public pool please read and obey all rules and posted signs, they are displayed to keep you, your family and friends safe. At the pool please be watchful of any non-durable flotation devices such as, inflatable tubes, inflatable floats, swim rings, noodles, water wings, inflatable vests, and blow-up rafts. These items are not considered a life saving device, tend to not be very sturdy, and are likely to fail without warning. Water wings can float off a child's arm, a belt float can unhook, and anyone can easily slide out of a noodle or inflatable tube. It is recommended by safety experts to utilize a US Coast Guard approved life jacket if a flotation device is needed.

A great way to learn about policies and procedures when it comes to water safety is to enroll in a water safety course, such as swim lessons, a CPR certification class, or by participating in community events such as the World's Largest Swim Lesson. Luckily, residents can take advantage of these opportunities right here in Celebration. Our aquatics program offers swim lessons for all ages and more recently began coordinating a community CPR class twice a year. Residents also have the opportunity to participate in the World's Largest Swim Lesson at Spring Park pool on Thursday, June 20, at 10 a.m. The event focuses on drowning prevention and the importance of teaching kids to swim and learning basic water safety skills.



TIPS:

Do not swim alone; even at a public pool or lifeguarded pool, use the buddy system

Teach family members basic water safety tips, and share safety instructions with family friends

Have a telephone close by when visiting the pool with family and friends

Keep small children away from pool drains, pipes and other openings to avoid entrapments

Learn to perform CPR on children and adults, and know when and how to call 9-1-1 or a local emergency number in the event of an emergency

Maintain constant supervision

If not a strong swimmer, always wear a life vest

Stay within designated swim areas.

Dog Park Etiquette
Being safe and learning to appreciate the rules

If you are living in Celebration and own a dog hopefully, you are familiar with our beautiful, perhaps best in class, Dog Park: Celebration Unleashed.

Here our dogs can run free, smell all the smells there are to smell, and play with their dog pals. Some dogs have favorites that they look forward to visiting with. We humans are able to chat with the friends we have made in the park, and meet new ones. However, like any gathering place it is important to know some basic dog park etiquette. Most of the basic points of etiquette tie directly back to rules for use of the dog park that your citizen volunteer dog park committee worked so many months to put into place. Not complying with these rules can put your dog or someone else's dog at risk. The rules in place are designed to help keep all dogs and patrons as safe as possible.

BASIC DOG PARK DO'S:

- Make certain your vaccinations are up to date. This is in fact a requirement to have access to the park.
- Keep your dog leashed until you have completely entered the park.
- Train your dog to enter the park calmly.
- Keep your dog on the appropriate dog side based on the guidelines...small dog side 35 pounds and under, and large dog side 35 pounds and up. Although small dogs may enjoy the large dog side, large dogs are not allowed on the small dog side.
- · If play gets too rough, stop it.
- · If your dog poops, scoop it up. Plenty of bags are available on both sides.
- Above all, enjoy this beautiful space!

BASIC DOG PARK NO NO'S:

- Every responsible dog owner knows the personality of his or her dog. If your dog is aggressive please do not bring he or she to the park. The dog park is not a place to socialize an aggressive dog.
- Please do not bring children under the age of six to the park. They are not permitted at all to be in the park even with a parent.
- · Distraction can pose a problem, whether it be with your phone or conversation. This can lead to an unsupervised dog. Constantly monitor your dog.
- Please do not bring food for yourself or your dog into the park.

Good dog park manners will go a long way to ensure we all enjoy this wonderful space. The most important dog park rules are posted at the entrance to both parks. A full set of the rules are found on the Celebration web site and at Town Hall. Please know these rules were developed using best practices from all over the country. Dog park etiquette doesn't just happen, but rather it must be practiced and implemented each and every time we enter the park. Now, get out there and enjoy the dog park!

What is a mommy-makeover?

Answer "Mommy makeover" is a term that is used to describe procedures that women typically want to address unfavorable changes to their body after being pregnant. It usually includes something to address their breasts and belly.

Many women feel their breasts have lost their shape after pregnancy and nursing. These problems can be addressed with either breast augmentation (typically breast implants), a breast lift (mastopexy), or a combination of both.

Typical belly complaints include excess fat, bulges, or loose skin. Procedures include liposuction (removal of fat only), abdominoplasty (tummy tuck), or a combination of both. Liposuction removes fat, but does not address excess skin issues. Abdominoplasty removes the lower belly skin and fat, and best addresses excess skin, especially if there is excess above and below the belly button. This is often combined with liposuction of the flanks or waist to help create a more flattering figure again. It can also tighten stretched out abdominal muscles, which often occur after pregnancy and can contribute to a protruding belly.

As every woman's body recovers differently from pregnancy and nursing, it is important to consult a boardcertified plastic surgeon to discuss which options would best address your concerns.

Q How do I know if I need a breast lift or implants?

Answer If you are happy with the size of your breasts, but not happy with the shape or sagging of the breast, a breast lift may be enough to help restore your breasts. However, if you are not satisfied with how full they are, even when wearing a bra, then you may need implants. Many women choose both procedures to help them achieve their goal, or they may compromise to avoid scars or implants.

When meeting with a board-certified plastic surgeon to discuss your goals, be clear and honest about what features bother you. An honest discussion will help you achieve your desired look.



A changing mole, however, can be one of the first signs of skin cancer. Yet, if caught soon enough, it is almost always curable. However, how do you know what to look for?

Dr. Rico recommends that you check your skin monthly and refer to the ABCs that dermatologists use when checking for melanoma, the most serious form of skin cancer:

- A Asymmetry. Does one-half of any mole on your body not match the other half? The mole does not have to be a perfect circle, but it should be symmetrical in shape and color, Dr. Rico says.
- B Border. Are the borders/edges of any mole on your body irregular, jagged or notched?
- C Color. Are there parts of a mole that are varying shades of black, brown, or tan, with white, pink, red, or even blue splotches? A mole with multiple colors, especially if the colors are asymmetric, is concerning, says Dr. Rico.
- D Diameter. Are any moles you have larger than 6 millimeters (the width of a pencil eraser) in diameter?
- E Elevated/Evolving. Has your mole grown? Does it itch, bleed or burn? Alternatively, is it changing, with new colors, a new size or shape?

Your ABCs should include F for Feeling. Sometimes people just have a strange or bad feeling about a lesion, even if they are not sure, it fits any of the ABCDE categories, she says.

Dr. Rico also points out that the ABC rules don't usually apply to children because they're still growing, which means their moles will grow, too. However, if your child has a mole that is growing rapidly, see your pediatrician immediately, she says.

The goal of putting your moles through the ABCDEs and Fs is to catch melanoma early, Dr. Rico says.

Melanomas don't all look like they do on the posters, and it's important to catch it in the early stages because it is extremely aggressive and can spread easily, notes Dr. Rico. You know your body better than anyone does so if you have a mole that violates any of the ABCDE guidelines, or if you just have a worrisome feeling, see your dermatologist immediately.

The fourth and fifth graders at Creation Village Preparatory School have been busy saving the Earth.



Explaining a rational approach to an emotional issue

Few issues spark greater emotional response than when individuals and families are faced with critical medical decisions. In recent years, the concept of patient autonomy, that is, the rights of patients to choose treatment free from pressure by physicians and others, has been gaining prominence in American society.

At first glance, who could argue with that? However, what happens if a patient is emotionally traumatized, impaired by illness or multiple factors, lacks an understanding of a potential medical procedure and its consequences, or if the decision affects others? Procedures such as abortion on demand, aggressive treatment for life-threatening diseases, and even immunization of children are just a few examples in which autonomy and well-being need to be carefully balanced.

We have invited nationally known medical doctor and author, Dr. John Littell, to return to Celebration to discuss the issue of patient autonomy, including as it relates to the rights of the unborn and to the elderly. Mark your calendars for our upcoming May 8 meeting, 6:30 p.m. at Celebration Town Hall.

Four years ago, Dr. John Littell explained to a full house at Heritage Hall some of the pros and cons of Obamacare. Many of his predictions have proven to be correct.

Continuing his fight for the reinstatement of the "do no harm" oath of physicians, Dr. Littell will explain the perils of patient autonomy, including as it affects the training of future physicians. Locally, Dr. Littell is a medical director of five crisis pregnancy centers in Central Florida, and has been outspoken about the opening of a Planned Parenthood office in Kissimmee.

After earning his MD from George Washington University, Dr. Littell served in the US Army, receiving the Meritorious Service Medal for his work in quality improvement; he also served with the National Health Service Corps in Montana. Dr. Littell has been on the faculty of the UCF School of Medicine, and was President of the County Medical Society and the Chief of Staff at the Florida Hospital. His practice (Kissimmee and Ocala) focuses on family medicine. He authored the book <u>The Hidden Truth: Deception in Women's Health Care A Physician's Advice to Women – and all who care for them.</u> Dr. Littell views his chosen vocation of family medicine as an offshoot of his faith, thus his emphasis on basic values, not protocol or popular culture.

Another issue that has attracted attention recently is the constitutionally mandated use of the Electoral College to elect our United States President. Everyone has been talking about it - so we did too. On April 10, noted constitutional expert Ron VonBehren explained the essential rationale for the Electoral College to UWS-CF. Sawdust

In the March issue of the Celebration News, we reviewed one of the most popular activities for wood workers, which was to make case goods (cabinets, clocks, shelving units, desks, tables).

This article will cover the LEAST favorite activity for wood workers, but we still do it if we cannot find someone else to do it to our satisfaction. The subject of this article is staining and putting a finish on our built projects.

Wood workers like to build. We like nicely stained and/or finished wood because it enhances the beauty of the wood we selected for the project. As messy as we like to get is wiping the glue off our fingers when we put projects together even though we usually emerge from our workshops covered in sawdust. Stain and finishing strains our tolerances. In addition, there are a myriad of finishes from lacquer, shellac, varnish, milk wash, paint, polyurethane, etc. Now days you need to know which will work with the stain being used so it does remove it and there is the choice in appearance when choosing between an oil-based finish (which will "golden" over time) or water-based (which will keep truer colors of the original wood but may not be as hard a finish).

In the accompanying pictures, you see a drop leaf table built by club member Jeff Howe. He chose black paint to match a decorating scheme. After the paint was applied (primer is a first coat which acts as a glue for the finish paint coats that follow) the finisher needs to sand between each coat just like any other finish so that pleasing tactile sensation of a smooth surface can be enjoyed by all who can't keep their hands off it. Jeff went the next step and had a tole painter (single stroke flowers, leaves, and ribbons) to add that touch of distinction.




